Three Reasons To Watch What We Say: 1. Our Tongue Where We Go "When we put bits into the mouths of horses to make them obey us, we can turn the whole animal." James 3:3 (NIV)

2. Our Tongue Can What We Have "Likewise the tongue is a small part of the body, but it makes great boasts. Consider what a great forest is set on fire by a small spark. The tongue also is a fire, a world of evil among the parts of the body. It corrupts the whole person, sets the whole course of his life on fire, and is itself set on fire by hell." James 3:5-6 (NIV)

NIV Application Commentary:

The power of the tongue. According to James, the tongue has great potential, but it is unstable. With it we both praise God and vilify our neighbor (3:9-10). This is irrational, he says—and rightly so. It is also an accurate depiction of our lives as Christians. It is this irrational power of the tongue to cause evil that led Henri Frederick Amiel to write, "In order to see Christianity, one must forget almost all the Christians."

Three Reasons To Watch What We Say:

1. Our Tongue Directs Where We Go

Read James 3:1-4

Why is it such a big responsibility to be a teacher? Especially scripture?

What do the examples of bit, rudder and fire teach about the importance of watching what we say?

2. Our Tongue Can <u>Destroy</u> What We Have Read James 3:5-8

How can our speech destroy what we have?

How do you feel about the rhyme, "Sticks and stones may break my bones, but words will never hurt me?"

In light of verse 8, what hope do we have in controlling our tongues?

3. Our Tongue <u>Displays</u> Who We Are

Read James 3:9-12

In light of your everyday conversations, how seriously do you take verse 9 & 10?

Read James 3:13-16

According to these verses, is your household acting wise or unwise?

What Should We Do? Read James 3:17-19

Which of these qualities do you need to develop in your life?

Close in Prayer: Start praying. Be bold and pray specifically.

pure. This refers to spiritual integrity and moral sincerity. Every genuine Christian has this kind of heart motivation (cf. Pss 24:3, 4; 51:7; Mt 5:8; Ro 7:22, 23; Heb 12:14).

peaceable. Means "peace loving" or "peace promoting" (cf. Mt 5:9).

gentle. This word is difficult to translate, but most nearly means a character trait of sweet reasonableness. Such a person will submit to all kinds of mistreatment and difficulty with an attitude of kind, courteous, patient humility, without any thought of hatred or revenge (cf. Mt 5:10, 11).

reasonable. The original term described someone who was teachable, compliant, easily persuaded, and who willingly submitted to military discipline or moral and legal standards. For believers, it defines obedience to God's standards (cf. Mt 5:3-5).

full of mercy. The gift of showing concern for those who suffer pain and hardship, and the ability to forgive quickly (cf. Mt 5:7; Ro 12:8).

without hypocrisy. The Gr. word occurs only here in the NT and denotes a consistent, unwavering person who is undivided in his commitment and conviction and does not make unfair distinctions (see 2:1-13 [notes]).

3:18 fruit is righteousness. Good works that result from salvation (cf. v. 17; Mt 5:6; see 2:14-20 [notes]; Gal 5:22 [note], 23 [note]; Php 1:11 [note]).

those who make peace. See v. 17 [note]. Righteousness flourishes in a climate of spiritual peace
